all circumstances even if we have to look deep to find them. Many shared that extra time spent with family and doing things we enjoy were blessings. My mom said that it has been a blessing to be able to attend worship at our church all the way from Missouri because we have been holding the services on Zoom.

Our church and multifaith campus has also received blessings as a result of our campus being closed over these last six months. Our three faith communities: Brookville Church, The New Synagogue of Long Island and the Muslim Reform Movement Organization have all seen an increase in attendance during our virtual services and study groups. A new online Bible Study has emerged that has afforded people from out of state to join in and has gathered participants from nine different faith communities!

This time of not meeting on our campus has given us the chance to do some improvements to the buildings we couldn't do when they were bustling with people. Our groundskeeper Rigo, has used this time to paint the trim, ceiling and walk in closest in fellowship hall. He has sprayed mold killer in the basement under the sanctuary where black mold had grown on the sheetrock, washed the basement floor and removed all the cobwebs.



When pandemic fatigue sets in, as it surely has and will continue for most of us, let us watch for "God Sightings" in our midst; places where God shows up with blessings.

The High Holy Days

The festival of Rosh HaShanah is observed on the 1st day of the Hebrew month of *Tishrei* (this year corresponding to September 19th). In Hebrew, Rosh HaShanah means, literally, "Head of the Year," and, as its name indicates, it is the beginning of the new Jewish year, 5781. Rosh HaShanah is not just a

Jewish holiday. Rosh HaShanah is the birthday of humankind, the anniversary of the creation of Adam and Eve, highlighting the special relationship between God and humanity.

Yom Kippur, the holiest day of the Jewish year, is observed on the 10th day of the Hebrew month of Tishrei (this year corresponding to September 28th). Yom Kippur commemorates the day when G-d forgave us for the sin of the Golden Calf. Forty days after hearing G-d say at Mount Sinai, "You shall not have the gods of others in My presence; you shall not make for yourself a graven image," we committed the sin of idolatry. Moses spent nearly three months on top of the mountain pleading with

G-d for forgiveness, and on the tenth of Tishrei it was finally granted: "Sawlachti" ("I have pardoned, as you have requested.")

The period between Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur is called the Ten Days of Repentance, or in Hebrew the *Asseret* Yimei Teshuva. During this time Jews contemplate repentance and ask for forgiveness

from anyone we may have wronged. The Ten Days allow each person to mend his/her ways to balance the scale of good and bad deeds in life. One of the ongoing themes of the Ten Days is the concept that G-d has a "Book" that our names are written in, thus deciding our fate for the next year. "The Book" is opened on Rosh HaShanah and our actions during the Ten Days can alter G-d's decree. The actions that change the decree are "teshuvah, tefilah and tzedakah," repentance, prayer, and good deeds (usually, charity). "The Book" is sealed on Yom Kippur for another year.

Every holiday in the Jewish year has a certain spiritual energy and potential which is responsible for creating the holiday. Every year we travel through the cycle of holidays and come again to that same point in time, and to that same event which happened on this date with its spirit and potential intact. In the beginning, before we were here, creation could be in only one direction. G-d spoke, and the world came to be. When we were created, G-d said, "Let us create man/woman in our own image." And from that day forward, our Divine mission is to be co-creators with G-d in the continuing act of creation. Every year, that act of creation replays on the awesome day of Rosh HaShanah, when our fate stands in the balance as G-d reviews our past year and decides whether or not to renew our lease on His planet.

Yom Kippur is the one day of the year when we can tap into the deepest level of our soul, which is to be truly one with G-d. Our connection with G-d is like the bond between parent and child - so deep, so essential, that it can never be severed. On Yom Kippur, G-d looks at us and sees part of Himself, the pure soul that can never, ever be damaged or blemished. In the face of such a strong revelation of

> our essence, not only are we forgiven for any negative thoughts, words, or deeds, but also we are given the chance to start anew with a fresh clean slate as "The Book" is sealed.

> Every Rosh HaShanah we enter that event of pre-creation once again, that time before all time began. We do not exist in the past at all since there is no past on this day We are expected

on this day to conceive of a plan to engage in a vision of the future, to have ambition and desire, to take an active part in G-d's supreme kingdom in the coming year as G-d's partner. We can remove ourselves from our past limitations and reach for the stars. We are new beings involved in a new and ambitious plan for reaching our ultimate destiny.

We have "chosen life" and have, in fact, signed ourselves into the "Book" for the coming year.





Constancy in Prayer

A human weakness mentioned several times in the Quran is that when people have trouble, they pray earnestly, but when the trouble is gone and they are feeling good, they forget about God. Let us consider Sura 10 Aya 12:

For [thus it is:] when affliction befalls man, he cries out unto God, whether he be lying on his side or sitting or standing; but as soon as God frees him of his affliction, he goes on as though he had never invoked God to save him from the affliction that befell him! Thus do their own doings seem goodly unto those who waste their own selves.

A similar statement occurs at seven other places in the Quran.

We can see this every day. When people run into trouble, they turn to prayer. They appeal to God sincerely and earnestly. They have no difficulty in believing that God can help them. This can be seen when someone has a serious accident, or on an airplane when it is caught in turbulent air, in a family where there is serious illness, when someone has suffered a major loss of income, or where a child is a source of trouble in a family. But it is also commonly seen that people lose interest in prayer when their problem is resolved and they come into a happy condition, not knowing that their life would be so much better if they recognized that God is always present. It will help them if they

cement their relationship with God when life is pleasant.

A person's relationship with God can be likened to a rope. Every time you think of God and call upon Him in a sincere manner, you add a strand to it. If you make it a practice to pray regularly, the rope keeps getting stronger, and eventually, you can feel it; it becomes a perceptible source of support for you in good times and bad. You can easily grasp it because it is always there. You no longer feel alone or feeble. But if you do not remember God for a long time, the strands unravel, one by one, and we no longer see the rope of God. So when bad times come again, we feel we are without support and fall into despair.

The way people pray when they are in trouble is very instructive. You can see the sincerity, the earnestness, and the emotion in the prayer. People pray as they are sitting in a waiting room, standing in line or in a hospital bed. People pray when they are driving or cooking and when they wake up in the night. They do not need any special rituals or preparations for prayer. The need is urgent, and the heart cries out for help. Your mind does not wander and concentration is easy. These are the attitudes that make prayer effective.

One of the many benefits of hardship is that it teaches us how to pray, so we can continue with it later when the trouble is removed from us.

The Next Chapter



August 30 was the twentieth live **ZOOM Sunday Worship** Celebration (plus two before Easter that were prerecorded). Brookville Church has used ZOOM as a means to continue holding a worship service with real connectivity for its members. Not much change seems to be

happening in future Covid-19 opening requirements and by Labor Day we will have passed the twentyfourth Sunday of Zoom worship and be into the seventh month of no live church services in the sanctuary. Who'da thunk it?

ZOOM, on the Internet has created an opportunity for continuity and connection of not just our Protestant church members but also the Muslim and Jewish groups. There have been some positive changes that happened during this pandemic time; both The New Synagogue of L.I. and the Muslim Reformed Movement Organization have increased their programs. Those changes were especially exciting to me. When I visited the earlier Shabbat services I felt that they were such a vibrant group, it was unfortunate they met only once a month. It seemed to me the real feeling was one of deep spiritual appreciation to be there and having their own place to worship. Now they meet twice a month. The Quran study has been going on for over eighteen years and when I first started attending their meetings it was amazing that the participants would spend two hours together in the Fellowship Hall or at a distance from their homes listening and talking to a telephone device which was broadcasting the meeting to their phones. They have had years of half a helping of what ZOOM now brings them - sight and sound. I first felt that our Muslim community had a cohesion that defied the challenges against their success, but I wondered how would they ever grow? Now, with ZOOM, they meet every Sunday afternoon. God does work in ways that amaze me, ways that are often unintended, unexpected, but just what God's people wanted.

For several years our Mulitfaith Campus was struggling to actually become a legal entity, one that would be able to enjoy more privileges than before. In the beginning, the unintended camaraderie of the three

faith groups was just a dream for the future, not on the front burner. Now our Multifaith Campus has been providing opportunities to share events together, events that are uncommon throughout the nation, celebrations of our shared Abrahamic connection. Now, during this difficult pandemic, when it was most unlikely, our Multifaith Campus has gained legal non-profit status. Who'da thunk it?

We all look forward to normalcy, times like before, but most thoughtful people say that we are in a transition and 'normal' will be something new when it does come. I accept that. I often think back to 1732 and how our Dutch Reformed Church started. Nine farmers and their families, people who traveled on horses and in wagons. but wanted to be together and fulfill their desire to worship their God. They wanted a church so life would be 'normal'. For nearly 290 years, while science and technology continually changed the world of the church in Wolver Hollow was pretty much the stable normal they wanted and any changes were minimal. Today our Multifaith Campus is beyond normal. I believe it will continue to grow, changing the unity of our groups in unimaginable ways while worshiping and praising a God that leads us and controls our collective destiny.
